A Message from our Executive Director

For 25 years, Rebuilding Together Nashville has been keeping our most vulnerable neighbors safe in their homes through cost-saving, critical home improvements. **In this challenging year, more than ever, our neighbors needed a safe place to call home.** After the March tornado and the start of the COVID-19 pandemic, we knew that Rebuilding Together was uniquely positioned to address the needs of vulnerable homeowners in our community, so we rolled up our sleeves and got to work. We launched a Tornado Recovery Program to ensure that all survivors could rebuild, regardless of their economic circumstance. We built new COVID-safety protocols for our home repair program so that we could fulfill our commitment to the Bordeaux community while protecting homeowners, contractors, and staff. With many older residents spending more time in their homes than ever before, we believed it was important that those homes be safe places to shelter to prevent hospital or nursing home stays. There is still so much work to be done, but I could not be prouder of how our organization has responded to the crises of this past year.

We have only been able to accomplish these things thanks to the support of our donors, partners, and volunteers. Your generosity inspires us to continue serving our neighbors in need, so we hope we can give some inspiration back in sharing about our successes this year in this annual report.

A Message from our Board President

In 2007, a little known former options trader named Nassim Nicholas Taleb published a book called "The Black Swan: The Impact of the Highly Improbable." Talib's work focused on the extreme impacts of rare and highly unforeseeable events – the very types of events that often shape, in profound and unexpected (and often underappreciated) ways, the course of history and the nature of human affairs. Taleb's work also contained many lessons on how best to approach a world characterized largely by the presence of uncertainty. Anyone who saw a photo of downtown Nashville on an otherwise beautiful Saturday afternoon in April of 2020 knew that what they saw, or rather, didn't see—no cars, no people, no music—were witnessing a "Black Swan" event. For many, that "event" quickly became inseparable from what practically became a freestanding nick-name: "2020."

Rebuilding Together shared in all the travails and challenges of 2020, but also exhibited another central concept of Taleb's work: robustness. Rebuilding Together's staff, board, and amazing volunteers, sponsors, and donors worked tirelessly, and with incredible generosity, to rise to the challenges and the unique historical moment posed by "2020." And despite unprecedented challenges, RTN was able to not only survive 2020, but to emerge on the other side as a stronger, more resilient, and more robust, organization. Critically, in a year where "home" meant even more than it usually does—at a time when Nashvillians, like everyone, were

required to spend more time at home—Rebuilding Together was able to continue carrying out its core mission of repairing homes, revitalizing communities, and rebuilding lives.

The term "black swan" also has roots in Latin, with perhaps the oldest reference being to the poet Juvenal's expression that "a good person is as rare as a black swan." Juvenal's black swans showed up in abundance in Nashville this year. Home will again be a powerful concept and a frequently heard term in this new year as the battle against the pandemic is still far from over. But, because of the support of our community—our black swans—more Nashvillians have safer and healthier homes in which to shelter from life's often unpredictable storms.



Rebuilding Together's 25 Safe & Healthy Housing Priorities were developed by our national office along with the National Center for Safe & Healthy Housing. We evaluate whether a home meets these priorities before we begin and after we complete repairs. In 2020, these were the priorities where we had the greatest impact across 15 homes.

Rebuilding After Disaster

A year on from the March 3rd tornado, our Tornado Recovery Program continues to serve homeowners who were impacted, making the necessary home repairs they need to fully recover. We were amazed and honored by the outpouring of support from our community in the aftermath of the tornado. Many of you gave supplies in the days after, gave financially, or gave your time to putting our neighbors' lives back together, and we cannot thank you enough. In particular, we'd like to thank Lowe's, Barge Cauthen, and Orcutt | Winslow volunteers who helped us repair exterior property damage that insurance and most grants weren't covering.

One of those homeowners we have had the pleasure of working with this past year is Mr. Cotten. A former band director at Hillsboro High School, Mr. Cotten has a love for music and his community. He retired to this home in North Nashville, which has been cared for by his family for generations. Mr. Cotten's roof, interior ceiling, gutters and outside shed all suffered extensive damage due to the tornado. Insurance covered his roof, but not the damage done to the rest of his property--that's where we were able to step in. RT volunteers cleared out the debris left in the backyard, and professionals from Lowe's built a new shed, complete with new tools to help Mr. Cotten bring his garden back in the Spring. We are now working to repair water damage and seal leaks caused by the tornado in addition to repairing the home's gutters.

While we have been able to assist several homeowners this year, the need for our services is still great a year later, and as homes have sat unrepaired for months after the disaster, we are encountering more homes with severe mold and water damage. We remain committed to serving as many homeowners as possible in our second year of running the Tornado Recovery Program. 
Neighborhood Spotlight: GOLDEN VALLEY

In the year since launching our target community initiative in Bordeaux, we received over 90 homeowner interest forms, a testament to the need for our services in the community. In 2020, we began working through this list one neighborhood at a time. One of the first of these was the Golden Valley neighborhood in the northeast corner of our target area. There, we served three homeowners within a block of each other, Ms. Turner, Ms. Daniel, and Ms. Cunningham, all long-standing members of the community.

Ms. Turner told us she couldn't remember the last time she could walk out her front door. Old carpet in the home made it nearly impossible to open, and she didn't have a railing

for her front steps. The carpet also posed a tripping hazard on her stairs and she had recently had a fall in her home when she applied. Rebuilding Together removed dangerous carpeting, renovated her bathroom with accessibility improvements, secured and installed stair railings, and removed asbestos in the kitchen ceiling. These and several other small repairs came together to make a big immediate impact in the health and safety of Ms. Turner's home.

Ms. Daniel's home has been a hub of family activity for many years, but as time wore on, repairs became more difficult to keep up with. Rebuilding Together was able to help her get her home back, installing accessible bathroom fixtures, new kitchen appliances and cabinets, vinyl flooring, and new windows. We also repaired electrical and plumbing systems and installed a new central HVAC system.

Even though her neighborhood is changing, Ms. Cunningham sees it as a good thing and she still knows most of the folks on her street. When we assessed the home, she was concerned about soft spots in her floor and the cost of her energy bills. We replaced rotted flooring in her kitchen as well as her aging roof, improved accessibility in her bathroom, and replaced her cracking front porch stair. We also installed a central heating and air conditioning system, where previously she had relied on space heaters and window units.

2020 added logistical challenges to our Safe and Health Home Improvement Program, but our impact in the lives of each homeowner remains the same. We continue to strengthen our partnerships in Bordeaux and are on pace to reach our goal of serving 65 homeowners by 2022.
