

Fiscal Year by the Numbers


FY 2022 (July 1, 2021-June 30, 2022)

We evaluate whether a home meets these priorities before we begin and after we complete repairs. In 2022, these were the priorities where we had the greatest impact across the 15 homes served by our Bordeaux Initiative.

Wrapping up our Disaster Recovery Program

In July 2022, Rebuilding Together Nashville completed our final home affected by 2021 Flooding and ending our Disaster Recovery Program. We are so proud of the work we were able to do to ensure homeowners who were first affected by the 2020 Tornados, and then later flooding in 2021, were able to move on to a new normal in their lives. Our disaster work truly serves our mission of: repairing homes, revitalizing communities and rebuilding lives. We are extremely proud of the work we were able to perform at 20 homes across Nashville; not only to get our neighbors back home but to rebuild safer and better than before the disaster struck. Much of the program's success can be attributed to the tireless work of Disaster Recovery Coordinator, Paulina Robles. A huge thank you to volunteers who continued to support us and our homeowners through the long term recovery process.

We would also like to thank our community of donors, grantors, and supporters who stepped up to help in the early days after March 3rd and continued stepping up long after. Special thanks to the Community Foundation of Middle Tennessee and the Federal Home Loan Bank of Cincinnati who made this program possible. 

Neighborhood Spotlight:

DICKERSON PIKE INITIATIVE

Since beginning our Bordeaux Initiative in 2019, Rebuilding Together Nashville has been committed to our target community approach--meaning we focus our safe and healthy home repairs in specific neighborhoods. This allows us to best serve our homeowners by concentrating our resources and being able to respond to the specifics needs of a community. In 2022, with the support of the Barnes Trust Fund for Affordable Housing, we were able to start searching for our new target community.



Boundaries of the new target community --Dickerson Pike Corridor. Homeowners south of Old Hickory Blvd, north of I-65 and Spring St interchange, west of I-24 and Brick Church Pk, and east of Elligton Parkway are eligible for home repairs.

Replicating the selection process of Bordeaux, we formed a Target Community Selection Taskforce. Members of this committee included community members from different sectors--Vanderbilt University School of Nursing, University of Tennessee College of Social Work, RTN board members and staff, and others. This taskforce analyzed socioeconomic data and completed windshield surveys of Nashville neighborhoods. We again looked for neighborhoods that had a high prevalence of homeowners, an older housing stock, lower household incomes, an aging population and strong neighborhood networks.

It became apparent through this process that the Dickerson Pike and the neighborhoods surrounding either sides have seen rapid growth in the past several years. Because of the groundwork that had already been laid in adjacent Bordeaux to build community trust, we believed we would be able to start work on homes and reach homeowners even faster. This neighborhood has been through a community planning process and identified preserving affordable housing as a main priority. This area also has highly invested council people and strong neighborhood associations.

In November 2022, we hosted a community town hall event giving community members access to their elected council and state representatives and discuss the topic of affordable housing. At this event, we officially committed to our revitalization work in the Dickerson Pike Corridor. Before beginning work, we already had received calls from around 45 homeowners in this area and are continuing to accept new applications. Additionally, we welcomed a new Construction Coordinator, Eloise Tyner, to work with our homeowners in this new area. We are excited to continue our outreach and begin repairs on homes in the coming year!
